Bad news has been defined as "any information which adversely and seriously affects an individual's view of his or her future" (Baille et al, 2000)

Planning

It is important that there is agreement in advance on who will cover each element of the process and where the transition in responsibility will be.





The Prologue

Ensure that we are all in the same play...

•Ask the family to explain their current understanding

•Consider giving a warning shot





Act I

Build off what you have been told by the family already





Act II

- Build toward and say the 'telegraphed reveal' It will likely be a shock to the family, but it should not be a surprise
- Be ready to give more explanation and answer their questions





Interval

Decouple- we guide the family towards accepting a break and agree to a second conversation to plan steps for end-of-life care.





Act III

...End of life Care planning can begin
