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














## About our speakers



Natalie Pattison, Professor of Clinical Nursing University of Hertfordshire/ East and North Herts NHS Trust @drnatpat

Professor Natalie Pattison is a clinical academic who has worked clinically in cancer, critical care and critical care outreach. She is a Professor of Clinical Nursing with a joint appointment across the University of Hertfordshire and East and North Herts NHS Trust (ENHT). Natalie also holds a Researcher in Residence (ICU) position at Imperial College London, with an honorary Nurse Consultant contract with Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust. She is the clinical lead for the critical care follow-up service at ENHT, combining this with a research role. Her research interests focus on her clinical area of critical care and critically ill ward patients, end of life in critical care, disability in critical care, and workforce in critical care. She is widely published in critical care. She is Chair of the National Outreach Forum, immediate past-Chair of UK Critical Care Research Group, and Chair of UK Critical Care Nursing Alliance. She is also Deputy Lead for the National Institute for Health Research National Specialty Group for Critical Care. Natalie is Chief Investigator for the NIHR-funded SEISMIC-R project.

Louise is a patient of University Hospitals Plymouth and lives with a rare condition known as Achalasia. In 2018, after an elective procedure and a rapid decline during recovery, Louise was given lifesaving surgery and placed into a medically induced coma, in which she would remain for 10 days. During her 13 day stay in ICU, she experienced severe delirium, placing her in a constant state of terror and confusion. Louise experienced terrifying scenarios in which she could sense everything. With her Delirium lasting several days after step down onto an acute ward and continued complications, Louise spent a total of 86 days in hospital. After a long period of rehab with psychological support Louise now advocates passionately on behalf of others, sharing her experiences and showing how a patient perspective can be invaluable to healthcare professionals and the wider healthcare community. She volunteers as part of University Hospitals Plymouth ICU rehab team, supports the trust and wider critical care community as a patient partner and is a PPV member of the NHS England Adult Critical Care CRG.

Mark is a Consultant Pharmacist in critical care, working in the area for over twenty years. He has varied interests that include practice aspects such as standardisation of medicines concentrations, administration compatibility charts, and pharmacy workforce deployment. Interests in therapeutic areas include stress ulcer prophylaxis, mucoactive agents, renal replacement therapy, and use of steroids. However, his first concern was in the management of delirium. Early in his career he witnessed first-hand a mosaic of different approaches applied to delirious patients with little commonality in approach, and so drew together a group of pharmacists to produce an evidential summary and guideline for the critical care community.
