Cathy McKenzie is Associate Professor in the Faculty of Medicine, University of Southampton, and an Honorary Consultant Pharmacist in Critical Care. She has extensive knowledge and clinical experience of medication use in critical illness. Her research interests are PKPD and medicines optimisation in critical illness. She is currently funded via the NIHR (National Institute for Health Research) Senior Clinical Practitioner Research Award. Cathy has a special interest in pain, sedation and delirium in the ICU.

Mark Borthwick, Consultant Pharmacist Critical Care Oxford University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust

Mark is a Consultant Pharmacist in critical care, working in the area for over twenty years. He has varied interests that include practice aspects such as standardisation of medicines concentrations, administration compatibility charts, and pharmacy workforce deployment. Interests in therapeutic areas include stress ulcer prophylaxis, mucoactive agents, renal replacement therapy, and use of steroids. However, his first concern was in the management of delirium. Early in his career he witnessed first-hand a mosaic of different approaches applied to delirious patients with little commonality in approach, and so drew together a group of pharmacists to produce an evidential summary and guideline for the critical care community.

David McWilliams is a Professor of Critical Care and Rehabilitation and Clinical Academic Physiotherapist at University Hospitals Coventry and Warwickshire and Coventry University's Centre for Care Excellence. He is the chair of the physiotherapy working group for the European Society of Intensive Care Medicine, and Chair for the Intensive Care Society National Rehabilitation Collaborative. David was a member of the guideline development group for the NICE guideline 'Critical Illness rehabilitation' and recently led an NCEPOD study of rehabilitation and recovery after critical illness. David is recognised as an international expert on critical care physiotherapy and rehabilitation, regularly presenting both nationally and internationally on the subject

Rachel qualified in 1992 from Middlesex Hospital School of Physiotherapy and during training enjoyed placements in respiratory care. Zoe van Willigen is a Critical Care Physiotherapist with over twenty years' experience in the speciality. She has led the early mobilisation project on ICU in Southampton since 2012, which is estimated to have saved her NHS trust over £2.5million. Zoe has conducted and published research into the family and patient experience of rehabilitation on ICU, leading to several pilot projects to address the provision of services throughout the ICU recovery pathway. Zoe is chair of the Thames Valley and Wessex Critical Care Network's rehabilitation group and is also employed by ICUSteps as a Rehabilitation Consultant to lead national online rehabilitation classes for former ICU patients. Zoe holds one of only 10 physiotherapy professional advisory group seats for the Intensive Care Society and is also on the specialist advisory group for the current NCEPOD trial into rehabilitation after critical illness.



Karen Elcock, Former Patient Frances Clark, Critical Care Rehabilitation and Follow-up Service Lead Frimley Health NHS Foundation Trust

Karen Elcock is a retired nurse and nurse educator. She worked in Intensive Care for 9 years and then in pre-registration nursing for 33 years; her final role was Deputy Head of School at Kingston University. She retired in 2022.

In 2024 she was admitted to hospital with bowel obstruction. Unfortunately her condition deteriorated post operatively and she was moved to ITU where she required further surgery, suffered multi system failure and was not expected to survive. Great care by the ITU team meant she confounded expectations and survived! However, the surgery left her with Short Bowel Syndrome which means she is reliant on Total Parenteral Nutrition (TPN) for the rest of her life. Karen spent a total of 4 months in hospital, of which 47 days were in ITU.

Karen is a committee member on the Frimley Hospital Patient and Relative Peer Support Group which is for former ITU patients and their relatives. Both she and her husband attend the quarterly meetings. She has also recorded a video of her experience in ITU for the staff at Frimley and is exploring other activities to improve the patient experience with the Frimley Critical Care Rehabilitation and Follow-up service team.

Professor Peter Brennan OBE, Consultant Maxillofacial Surgeon and Honorary Professor of Surgery Portsmouth Hospitals University Trust

Professor Peter Brennan is a Consultant Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeon in Portsmouth, specialising in head and neck oncology with a personal chair for his research and education achievements. He has over 860 publications, with over 90 on patient safety, team working and human factors. He is a committed trainer and educator. Peter won the coveted Silver Scalpel Award in 2022– the most prestigious accolade for training excellence across all 10 UK surgical specialties.

He has edited 8 specialty surgery textbooks and is Lead Editor of Gray's Surgical Anatomy which receives worldwide acclaim.

Peter is interested in human factors (HF) and patient safety, and has established unique collaborations with airline pilots, National Air Traffic Services (NATS) and the Royal Air Force Aerobatic Team (Red Arrows). His work improves practice across surgical, medical and dental specialties and includes reducing hierarchy, enhancing team working and raising awareness of many personal factors to reduce error. For all this work, he has been awarded several national prizes and Honorary Fellowships (the highest College accolade) from the Royal Colleges of Surgeons of Edinburgh and Glasgow.

In 2019, Peter successfully completed a PhD entitled 'Applying HF to Improve Patient Safety.' He works with the Royal Colleges, GMC, medical and surgical specialty associations, NHS Trusts and many other organisations to help improve patient safety and better teamworking. He promotes equality, diversity and training at every opportunity.

Earlier this year, Peter was awarded an OBE in the King's Birthday Honours for his outstanding contribution to Surgery and improving patient safety.

Alongside this she has taught midwives, doctors and nurses on deterioration of the pregnant patient as well as being an ALS instructor and completing my MSc in Advanced Clinical Practice.

Lisa started as a Consultant Midwife in UHD in 2018- this meant continuing training to multiple staff groups as well as supporting women and birthing people requesting care out of guidance alongside leading regional work on development of pathways of care. She was involved in the development of the latest care in labour NICE guidance and continues to review cases for the triennial MBRRACE reports.

In 2023 she changed role to the Maternal Medicine network working with clinicians across Wessex to care for women with complex disease. Lisa is passionate about ensuring high quality care to women with multiple pathologies and considering how this will affect their choices from conception to the postnatal period.
